

- Population: Peru has about 33 million people. That's like filling up a big
 - soccer stadium 330 times!
- Age Distribution: Most people in Peru are young, with lots of kids and
 - teenagers. Imagine a big school with lots of classrooms filled with students
 - of different ages.
- Ethnicity: In Peru, there are many different groups of people. Most are

either Mestizo (mixed Indigenous and European), Indigenous, or have

European ancestry. It's like a beautiful patchwork quilt of different

cultures!

• Language: The main language spoken is Spanish, but many people also

speak Quechua and Aymara, especially in the highlands. It's like having the

power to speak and understand multiple secret codes!

• Religion: Most people in Peru are Roman Catholic, but there are also other

religions practiced. It's a place where many people share similar beliefs

but also respect different ones.

• Urbanization: About 79% of people live in cities, like the capital city, Lima.

This means most people are closer to things like schools, hospitals, and

shops, just like living in a busy beehive!

• Biodiversity: Peru is super special because it has lots of different plants

and animals, more than most countries. From tall mountains to deep

jungles, it's like nature's treasure chest!



- Peru is a country in South America that's home to a section of Amazon rainforest and Machu Picchu, an ancient Incan city high in the Andes mountains. The region around Machu Picchu, including the Sacred Valley, Inca Trail and colonial city of Cusco, is rich in archaeological sites. On Peru's arid Pacific coast is Lima, the capital, with a preserved
 - colonial center and important collections of pre-Columbian art
- The first thing you will notice when comparing an alpaca and a llama is

their size difference. Llamas are significantly bigger than alpacas.

• Llamas have a longer face with a larger muzzle. Alpacas, on the other

hand, have round, smooshed faces. They also have fluffy fur on their

face, especially on their foreheads. Llamas tend to have short and thin

fur around their face. Alpacas have softer facial features than llamas.

Because of this, many people believe alpacas are the cuter of the two.

• Arpilleras or cuadros, exquisitely detailed hand-sewn three-

dimensional textile pictures, illustrate the stories of the lives of the

women of the shantytowns (pueblo jovenes) of Lima, Peru and

provide essential income for their families.

• Each year on June 24 (the winter solstice in the Southern Hemisphere)

Cusco celebrates the Inca Festival of the Sun – Inti Raymi. Created by

Inca Pachacutec, Inti Rami was a tribute to venerate the Sun God Inti.

Nowadays, the festival draws thousands of local and international

visitors, to the ancient Inca capital, Cusco, to celebrate on of the most

important events of the calendar.

Peru is full of amazing landmarks! Here are some of the most famous

ones, perfect for sparking the imagination of children:

• Machu Picchu: This is like a mysterious castle high up in the clouds!

It's an ancient city built by the Inca people on top of a mountain.

People from all over the world hike up a long trail to see its beautiful

stone buildings and stunning views.

• Nazca Lines: Imagine giant drawings on the ground that are so big you

can only see them from the sky! These are the Nazca Lines, and they

include shapes of animals and other mysterious designs. People still

wonder how and why they were made hundreds of years ago.

• Lake Titicaca: This is the highest navigable lake in the world and it's

said to be the birthplace of the sun in Inca mythology. It's so big and

high up that it feels like you're close to the sky!

• Colca Canyon: It's one of the deepest canyons in the world, even

deeper than the Grand Canyon! You can see huge birds called condors

flying above you, which have really wide wings.

• The Sacred Valley: This valley was very important to the Incas because

of its fertile land and great weather. Today, you can see old ruins,

traditional villages, and beautiful landscapes.

• Lima's Historic Center: In the capital city, Lima, there's a historic area


with old churches, palaces, and plazas. It's like stepping back in time
